

Capital Credits To Be Returned

Consumers who were members of Piedmont Electric in 1979 and 1980 will soon receive their share of the capital credits for those years.

This is just one of the benefits of being a member of a cooperative. All money after the bills have been paid are returned to those who were receiving service based on the amount of electricity they bought during the affected years.

General retirement checks will be mailed to those active accounts with retirements of \$50 and more. Those whose capital credit retirements are less than \$50 will receive credits on their electric bills.

Inactive accounts with general retirements of \$20 and more will also receive a check, providing there is a current mailing address on file. For those with less than \$20 in their patronage account, checks will be held until the \$20 amount is met in a future year.

With this retirement of capital credits, Piedmont Electric will be refunding approximately \$580,000 to current and former members this year, including approximately \$170,000 that is being returned to the estates of deceased members.

As a not-for-profit organization, the Cooperative refunds money as long as it is fiscally responsible to do so. Until a specific year is "retired," the money is used for maintenance of the electrical system, and to allow Piedmont to meet the financial requirements of our lenders.

Piedmont Electric & ElecTel CCU will be closed for the Christmas holidays on Friday, December 24, and Monday, December 27, and on Friday, December 31, for the New Year's holiday. Employees will be on call. Please have a safe, joyous holiday season. Merry Christmas! *Co-op, Employees Ready for Food, Toy Donations*

Cash donations will also be accepted at each office. Toys and non-perishable food items will be purchased for the drive with any cash donations received.

Non-perishable foods for the holiday season include canned/ evaporated milk, cake mixes, sugar, dried fruits, popcorn, crackers, canned fruits, peanut butter, jelly, soup, candy, etc.

Designated Piedmont Electric employees at the three branch offices will deliver these items to the Social Services Department in each of the three counties.

This project is part of the Cooperative's commitment to the communities in which we live and serve.





From Your President...

Determining the Most Equitable Rates

Finding the most fair and equitable way of setting rate schedules to recover cost has always been a goal for your electric cooperative.

Throughout the years Piedmont Electric has set rates primarily based on the number of kilowatthours (kWhs) members use.

We realize we need to create the right retail rate environment for energy efficiency, conservation and to recover cost from our members more equitably.

And, we need to provide you, our member-consumers, with meaningful rates that will help you better control your electric bills.

Under Piedmont Electric's current rate structure, the base facilities charge is used to offset the cost of delivering power to your home.

The key word is "offset." Though some of the cost of delivering service is built into the base facilities charge, the remainder is factored in to the cost per kWh.

Bowen Road Helena-Moriah Road (and surrounding areas) The cost varies on how much electricity the consumer uses.

Our goal is to recover the cost of delivering electricity to members as fairly as possible for both larger and smaller use consumers.

Consider what goes in to distributing electricity to you. This includes equipment, such as poles, transformers, metering equipment, substations and other "hardware."

Behind the scenes, there are costs associated with accounting, customer service and, of course, linemen.

There are also other costs associated with our business, such as taxes, equipment and right-of-way maintenance.

These things represent about 40% of Piedmont Electric's total operating costs regardless of how many kWhs are used.

After much study and consideration, your Board and management team believe these fixed costs should be more equitably divided among all Piedmont Electric member-consumers.

As a result, we will be recovering more of the fixed costs in the facilities charge portion of your monthly bill.

The remaining 60% of the Cooperative's costs goes for wholesale power, which fluctuates with the marketplace.

In addition to the rate schedule for each type of consumer (residential, small power, etc.) the market fluctuations can be addressed on the wholesale power cost adjustment (WPCA) portion of your monthly bill, if necessary.

Next month Piedmont Electric will be changing its rate schedules to better reflect the actual cost of delivering electricity to your home or business.

Some members will actually see their costs go down, while others may see a slight increase, based on the amount of power they use. Of course, there will be some members who will see no change in their cost of service.

We will address the adjustments in the January newsletter when the change becomes effective.

ENGINEER VOLUNTEERS AT BOLIVIAN CO-OP



When asked by NRECA's International Foundation to help provide some substation training this year in Bolivia, Robin Blanton, Piedmont Electric's Manager of Engineering, agreed to go.

Robin visited nine urban and three rural substations belonging to CRE, the largest power distribution system in Bolivia and the oldest overseas co-op affiliated with NRECA.

CRE was in the process of upgrading and renewing some 15 substations. Based on their

visits to the sites, Robin and the other volunteers offered recommendations to CRE for standardization of design features and maintenance procedures.

Thanks to the volunteers' efforts, CRE staff gained a greater understanding of the need for bypass schemes for all main breakers, plus additional details on arrangements for protecting outgoing secondary lines.

Robin says his approach was to keep things as simple and as standardized as possible. "Don't try to reinvent the wheel every time something new comes along," he says, "But don't be afraid to change things when it is truly necessary."

He says he thinks the training efforts were successful and that the local co-op employees appreciated the volunteers' training efforts.
