2011 Annual Meeting **Preparations Underway**

The 2011 Annual Meeting of the Members is being planned for Friday, April 15, at Orange Senior High School in Hillsborough.

All persons nominated for election to the Cooperative's Board of Directors must meet the qualifications guidelines as set by the bylaws, Section 4.02. A copy of the bylaws is available on request.

Four seats on the Board of Directors will be up for election at the meeting. The following are the incumbents on the Board whose terms expire this year, as well as their respective Directorate Districts:

Piedmont Electric is governed by a Board of Directors elected by the membership from among its members. The Bylaws of the Cooperative provide for the nomination of directors by several methods.

Balancing Smart Grid Buzz with Common Sense

A lot of us get excited about the latest gadget to hit the market. It might cost a bit extra, but most of us simply have to have it. I never quite understood the excitement—until now.

At Piedmont Electric, we've implemented aspects of the so-called "smart grid." We have installed "smart" meters at every member's home.

These "smart" meters give you daily energy information. As with any cutting-edge concept, it seems new smart grid bells and whistles are constantly being touted.

While we've been careful not to get caught up in the hype, I often have members ask me, "What's all the buzz about?"

The North American electric grid—the largest interconnected machine on earth—operates as a humming highway moving electricity from power plants to your home.

About 3,000 utilities operate 10,000 power plants nationally. All

of this power—more than one million megawatts—flows across 300,000 miles of high-voltage transmission lines.

And, while the way we use electricity has changed drastically over the decades, most of the highway that delivers power to our homes was built 50 years ago.

As we talk about upgrading the nation's grid from a hands-on, mechanical system to a digital "smart" network, there are three key words to remember: affordability, efficiency and reliability.

To keep electric bills affordable, a smarter grid will provide tools to help improve operations and reduce costs.

Technology focused on boosting efficiency could shrink our carbon footprint by letting you reduce your electric use during peak demand periods.

Finally, a smarter grid will be more secure and can help us restore service following an outage much faster and safer. Piedmont Electric continues to test technologies that will enhance our existing "smart" grid meters such as MyUsage.com and FlexPay programs, to see what make the best sense for our members.

Annual Toy, Food Drive Underway



Tax-Free Weekend

Remember to take advantage of this year's tax-free weekend on Energy Star appliances November 5-7. If you plan to buy a new appliance soon, this is a good time to buy an energy efficient model, and avoid paying N.C. sales tax on your purchase.

Once again Piedmont Electric is collecting for its annual Holiday Toy and Non-Perishable Food Drive at each of the Cooperative's three office locations.

New toys for children (infant-I2 years of age) and items for the teenage group (ages I3-I8) are accepted at each location through December 3 at the Cooperative's Hillsborough, Roxboro and Caswell County office locations.

Cash donations will also be accepted at each office. Toys and

non-perishable food items will be purchased for the drive with any cash donations received.

Non-perishable foods for the holiday season include canned/ evaporated milk, cake mixes, sugar, dried fruits, popcorn, crackers, canned fruits, peanut butter, jelly, soup, candy, etc.

Designated Piedmont Electric employees at the three branch offices will deliver these items to the Social Services Department in each of the three counties.

This project is part of the Cooperative's commitment to the communities in which we live and serve.

Procedures Provided for Board Nominations

The following is an excerpt from the Bylaws pertaining to nominations.

SECTION 4.06. Nominations.

(a) Nominations Committee: It shall be the duty of the Board to appoint a Nominations Committee consisting of ten (10) persons who are members but are not directors or close relatives of directors, and who are so selected that each of the Cooperative's Directorate Districts shall have one representative thereon.

The Committee shall meet and nominate candidates for each of the Cooperative's Directorate Districts to be elected at the next annual meeting and the at large director if that directorate is to be elected at the next annual meeting.

The Committee shall nominate not less than two (2) nominees for each such District and shall show clearly which nominees are opposed with respect to the same Directorate District. In addition, the Committee shall nominate, each three (3) years, not less than two candidates for the "at large" position.

The Committee shall meet and complete its nominations no later than thirty days preceding the deadline for nomination by petition as is set forth in the following subsection

to provide the opportunity for any qualified member who desires to be placed on the ballot at the upcoming annual meeting but not nominated by the Committee, to seek nomination by petition as set forth in the following subsection.

(b) Nominations by Petition: Any fifty (50) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, in like manner listing the nominees separately with respect to the Directorate Districts from which they are nominated, on or before **February 14** preceding the annual meeting at which such directors are to be elected.

The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, or through

(c) Mailing of Notice of Elections:

meeting, or separately, or through any publication routinely used by the Cooperative for communication with the membership on a monthly basis at least seven (7) days and not more than forty-five (45) days prior to the meeting, a statement of the number of directors to be elected from each of the Directorate Districts, and the names and addresses of all nominees for each such district, showing separately those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any.

(d) Posting of Nominations: Once the signatures of the members on any petition and the qualifications to serve of the nominees are verified, the names of all nominees for each directorate district and the names of each nominee for the at large directorate, if it is to be elected at the upcoming annual meeting, shall be posted at the principal office of the Cooperative.

The Posted Notice of all nominees shall show the directorate for which each nominee seeks election as director and may indicate those nominated by the nominations committee and those nominated by petition.

(e) Announcement at the annual meeting: The candidates and their respective districts shall be announced at the annual meeting prior to the election of directors. There shall be no nominations from the floor at the annual meeting. Elections shall be conducted in accordance with Section 4.03.

(f) Validity of Elections: Notwithstanding the provisions contained in this section, failure to comply with any of such provisions shall not affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken by the Board after the election of directors.

Chocolate Peanut Clusters

- 2 tablespoons peanut butter I cup (about 6 ounces) butterscotch chips
- I cup (about 6 ounces) semisweet chocolate chips
- 2 cups salted spanish peanuts

Melt peanut butter, butterscotch chips and chocolate chips in microwave oven. Stir until smooth. Stir in peanuts.

Drop by rounded teaspoons on to waxed paper and place in refrigerator until firm. Yields 48 clusters.
