



TAKE CONTROL OF YOUR ELECTRIC BILL AND STAY WARM THIS WINTER!

Did you know that heating and cooling your home can be the largest part of your energy bill each month? Many members are surprised this time of year by expensive electric bills caused by the colder weather. When the temperature drops outside, your heating system has to work harder to keep your home comfortable, which requires more energy and raises your electric bill.

Unlike some utilities, such as cable, which charge you a fixed price each month for a service no matter how much you use, a large part of your Piedmont Electric bill is determined by the amount of kilowatt-hours (kWh) you use. This puts your electric bill in your control! If you and your family find ways to use less energy, you'll see a lower electric bill.

What can I do to help control my electric bill? Today's modern programmable thermostats are a great way to reduce your heating and cooling costs. Programmable thermostats work by lowering the temperature of your home while you are away (or at night) and then bringing your home back to a comfortable temperature by the time you return, as efficiently as possible.

You simply tell your learning thermostat your habits and it will do all the work for you! Programmable thermostats start as low as \$25 while a learning thermostat can cost about \$200. Consider a powerful Nest Learning Thermostat, which learns your habits. Studies have shown that it can cut the heating part of your electric bill by 12%.

How can I monitor my usage?

Piedmont Electric offers a number of ways for our members to monitor their energy usage. Our SmartHub application offers daily information about energy use in your home. We also offer the Analyze My Bill tool which takes your actual electric bill and shows you where and how you use energy. Find out more about these tools at pemc.coop.

Is a Time of Day (TOD) rate right for you?

Do you want to lower your bill?
Do you have a programmable thermostat? Then a TOD rate may be right for you!

TOD rates work by giving program participants a lower rate when they use electricity off-peak; times of low demand. Participants should avoid using electricity on-peak; times when electricity is in high demand like early cold mornings in the winter and hot afternoons in the summer.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Technology has the possibility of changing the electric utility industry. Piedmont Electric wants to be part of the change, if it benefits the members, by improving service and controlling cost. Modern technology would allow many new options for the production and utilization of electricity—what we like to call the Utility of the Future (UOF).

The UOF could utilize technology to manage energy on both sides of the meter. As an example, many members are installing solar generation; if all these solar sites could be controlled through new technologies they could help the existing large power plants run more efficiently. When these solar electric producers are managed as a group the energy produced could help the large power plants remain at peak efficiency, saving money for fuel and reducing carbon emissions for everybody.

The UOF could also manage how and when the customers use electricity. With the customer's permission, new technologies could be used to reduce electric load by controlling appliances, lighting, heating and air conditioning equipment, etc. If a large number of customers allowed the utility to



control their equipment that managed electric load could also (like solar) be used to improve existing power plant efficiency.

In addition, this increased efficiency could delay the cost of new power plant and transmission/distribution line construction. We also could use this modern technology to more efficiently manage substation voltage control, which will also reduce load and carbon emissions. In this UOF, small solar generators, voltage control and member equipment that is load managed could actually become a dependable power supply resource.

These new technologies can also help the customer make better energy-buying decisions. New advanced metering systems would be able to give the customer real-time

information about their energy usage and help the customer take control of their energy bill. Advanced metering systems would also allow for more efficient power restoration during power outages.

Overall, the UOF offers us opportunities to increase the safety and reliability of our grid, lower emissions and maintain affordability of electricity for our members. While we may not know exactly what the future holds, we do know that the future is bright and the more we work together, the stronger we'll be in powering our future. NC BRIGHT IDEAS PROGRAM ENRICHING LIVES OF LOCAL STUDENTS & TEACHERS

Every year, Piedmont EMC awards outstanding, local teachers educational grants to fund engaging classroom projects for their students. This year, we awarded over \$25,000 in Bright Ideas education grants to 23 area teachers with more than 6,800 students at schools in Alamance, Caswell, Durham, Orange and Person counties benefitting from these projects.

One local recipient, Kim Kelleher, a school counselor from New Hope Elementary School in Hillsborough, is also a three-time Bright Ideas grant winner. "The Bright Ideas education grant program has supported my efforts to introduce 'outside the box' teaching; literally outside on our school nature trail. We created a one-mile nature trail outside in the woodland forest surrounding our school."

Not only have these Bright Ideas grants provided Mrs. Kelleher with the resources and materials necessary for outdoor learning for her students, but they have enriched the lives of our state's youth. "With help from the Bright Ideas grant program and the National Parks, I began Junior

Rangers and Friends of the Nature Trail Programs. Over time, students have been able to lead tours on our nature trail for other students and visitors. These programs have had a major impact on our school climate and student achievement."

New Water Heater Regulations Restrict Tank Sizes

If you plan on purchasing a water heater that is larger than 55-gallons, you will need to go through Piedmont Electric to complete your purchase, as hardware stores and other retailers are no longer allowed to sell these sizes directly to consumers.

Additionally, electric water heaters larger than 55 gallons must have this larger heater on Piedmont Electric's Load Control program, which pays the member \$1 per month to allow the cooperative to reduce electricity to the heater during periods of high energy demand. Water heaters keep a supply of hot water, and most members won't notice when their water heaters are under Load Control.
